Course Description

The Music in Medicine Capstone course is the culminating course in the Undergraduate Certificate in Music in Medicine. Objectives

- 1. Identify individual goals for using music to address health in a healthcare or community setting.
- 2. Analyze literature as it relates to the use of music in a healthcare or community setting.
- 3. Articulate theoretical foundations that inform the practice of music in a healthcare or community setting.
- 4. Differentiate between music in health and music therapy practices.
- 5. Design a formal research paper and presentation.

Course Format and Content

The purpose of this capstone course is to allow students to synthesize, integrate, and apply the skills acquired through previous coursework in the Music in Medicine certificate program. This class will meet asynchronously and synchronously. Students will engage in a literature review and presentation, proposal writing, and participate in peer reviews to deepen understanding of arts in health practice.

- Literature Review: Conduct an in-depth, independent survey of the literature as it relates to the intersections between music and health.
- Capstone Project Proposal: Develop a capstone project proposal on an instructor approved topic related to music in healthcare of community settings and informed by a literature review which includes your initial goals, timeline, and expected outcomes.
- Capstone Project: Design a capstone project that can be implemented in a healthcare or community setting.

- Capstone Paper: Compose a paper of 4500-5000 words in APA format of current literature including an abstract, introduction, background, discussion, limitations and recommendations, conclusions, and references.
- Capstone Presentation: Prepare a 20-minute presentation based on the content of the capstone project and paper, including limitations and recommendations.
