

- 45 yom with Spinal Cord Injury
- 23 yom with below knee amputation after MVA
- 11 yof with traumatic brain injury needing inpatient rehabilitation

Where do these patients go in the UF Health System?

Answer: No where. These are some of several areas without long term follow-up at UF Health

Respond to Changes in Health Care

- Legislative changes moving towards cost-efficient care, fewer or less costly procedures, focusing on function and QOL, where PM&R is the "specialty of function".
- PM&R has been identified as an area of need in State of FL.
- <u>Post-acute care</u>: Reduce length of stay, reduce costs, readmissions, facilitate discharge
- PM&R coordinates multiple specialties ("Primary Care") for people with disabilities and congenital medical issues.
- Standard of Care: Data and position stands increasingly favoring non-operative (exercise, diet, lifestyle, therapy) care over invasive procedures will lead to <u>increased demand for</u> <u>PM&R providers</u>



Proposal to Re-Organize the UF Department of Orthopaedics and Rehabilitation

We are proposing to re-organize the Department of Orthopedics and Rehabilitation by having the Division of Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation (PM&R) transition to an independent Department of PM&R. The field of PM&R is a broad specialty that includes the care of patients with a spinal cord injury (SCI), stroke, traumatic brain injury (TBI), limb amputations, congenital disabilities, pain, cancer, neuromuscular diseases and musculoskeletal issues. The focus of PM&R is to improve the function, both physical and psychological of people who have suffered an injury or who have a disability. The Division of PM&R was initially formed to provide musculoskeletal and spine care for patients of the Department, but did not provide care for patients with the various issues listed above. Once patients were stabilized in the acute care hospital, there weren't clinics or services in place for long term follow-up for patients with SCI, TBI, stroke, limb amputations, etc. In 2014, the UF College of Medicine recognized that to provide comprehensive care to both current and future patients, services across the spectrum of the PM&R specialty needed to be developed. Since that time, the PM&R Division has grown to now include Pediatric Rehabilitation for Children with Disabilities, Ambulatory follow-up for patients with TBI/Stroke, a clinic for limb amputations and neuromuscular diseases as well as coverage of patients in the new inpatient rehabilitation hospital.

During the process of expanding PM&R services, it became clear that for the PM&R program to continue expanding to meet clinical, research and teaching goals, it would need to transition to an independent Department. The direction of the growth is outside of the framework of orthopaedics and incorporates integration with neurology, urology, neurosurgery, OB-GYN, physical therapy, occupational therapy, speech language pathology, oncology, cardiology, cardiothoracic surgery as well as other clinical and science departments. In order to continue the strategic growth and integration, PM&R needs to evolve from a Division to a department not only for the reasons listed, but to meet a mandate from the College of Medicine leadership. The mandate was to develop a preeminent Top 10 ranked PM&R Department. The Chairs of the Top 10 PM&R Departments were interviewed as well as site visits to several other programs were completed and it became clear that to reach that level of recruitment and academic reputation, two things needed to occur, UF needed to establish a PM&R Residency Program, and PM&R needed to transition to a Department to be competitive in recruiting excellent faculty. Also, the PM&R rankings are only for Departments, Divisions are not ranked in the current format. When examining our peer institutions, all of the top 10 medical centers in the country have PM&R Departments and all of the top 20 public academic medical centers on the US News and World Report honor Roll have PM&R Departments. The UF Health leadership has recognized that to both meet the needs of our patients and achieve a top national ranking, the development of a comprehensive academic PM&R Department was an important step.

On January 13, 2020 the ACGME informed us that our application for a PM&R Residency had been approved with our first class to arrive on July 1, 2021.

On November 18, 2019 the Faculty of the Orthopaedics and Rehabilitation Department conducted a vote regarding PM&R transitioning to a Department and the vote was 29 in favor and 0 opposed. During the past five years of the process, a stringent evaluation of the PM&R was conducted to determine the viability of the Division to become a department. Current PM&R faculty have been successful in competing for NIH, foundation, and private funding having one of the most successful grant and

publishing records in the department. The Division consistently ranks among the top 2 or 3 divisions within the department in terms of clinical revenue and patient volume. Members of the department currently hold leadership positions on National and International organizations with the field, are on editorial boards of the flagship journals in the field, and hold elected positions on the American Board of PM&R. Due to the financial and academic achievements of the faculty, the analysis concluded that the Division is well-positioned to make the transition to Departmental status.

The anticipated impact of the new Department would be quite broad. With the faculty expansion and development of clinical offerings that were not previously available, it is anticipated that the expansion will result in an increase of 45,000 patient visits per year, and more than 2800 inpatient admissions. In addition to improving patient access, these new clinical programs will result in increased use of ancillary services (radiology, physical therapy etc) and specialty consults. From a budgetary perspective, the formation of the PM&R Department will have a positive effect on the revenue to the UF Health system.

The Florida State Legislature identified PM&R as an area of need for the state due to a shortage of PM&R providers in the state. The formation of a PM&R Department will help in the recruitment of excellent faculty who can then train the next generation of PM&R physicians to help serve the population of the State of Florida and address this provider shortfall.

In order to develop a comprehensive, top 10 PM&R program, that will serve the needs of our patients, foster academic growth, expand research opportunities and provide new training opportunities, we are requesting that the PM&R Division transition to a Department of PM&R. The transition has the support of the Orthopaedics and Rehabilitation Faculty, Dr. Tyndall, the Interim Dean of the COM, as well as the VP of Health Affairs, Dr. Nelson. The Division has demonstrated clinical success both in terms of reputation on a national level and with financial viability, academic success in terms of grants and publishing and is integrated with teaching across the spectrum of undergraduate students through fellows and doctoral students.
