Rationale

Because of the role this course plays for the major and the limited number of seats available each semester, this course is being consistently held for graduating seniors to make sure they can graduate on time, as students outside the major are able to enroll. This change would help to ensure that only criminology majors are able to enroll in the class, which will help to decrease problems that arise during registration.

RE: Curriculum change request for CCJ 4014 and CCJ 3701

Curriculum Committee Questions: What are the registration issues the department is running into? What is the course capacity? What other majors (and how many of them are there per semester) are routinely taking the course if they aren't criminology majors, and how does this new prereq limiting to criminology majors impact them?

Answer: A typical section for these classes will have an enrollment cap set at between 48 to 60 students. Currently any student of 3LS standing who has taken the pre-requisite course, CCJ 3024, is eligible to enroll in these classes. This typically includes other students who are majors in CLAS, such as psychology, political science, and economics, for example, and this also includes students who are majors in other colleges, such as the college of business, as their students are able to earn a criminology concentration. However, this list is not inclusive, as it can include students from any major who have taken the pre-requisite course described. The main issue this causes (to allow all of the currently eligible students to enroll) during registration is that if students outside the major are able to register for these classes, then graduating criminology seniors may not be able to get a seat.

Also, students in other majors with more credits are able to register before many of the criminology students, especially those who are juniors and lower. In practice, we allow our freshmen and sophomores to take these classes as well if they have met prerequisites and feel ready. However, they often cannot get into the courses they need until much later in their careers here, which causes potential problems for them down the line. In fact, there have been some semesters in the past when the courses fill up in the first few days leaving our other majors without the option. So, each semester, the department has to put in place a complex system of holds, such as TRA codes and department holds, to prevent these classes from filling up too quickly. The department has also responded by assigning more instructors to teach these classes in order to increase the number of seats available, which reduces the variety of criminology classes that are able to be offered each semester. However, other problems may also arise.

Even with holds in place, the course will still appear to students as having available seats, and students will still be able to see that they are otherwise eligible to take the class (if they are of 3LS standing and have taken the pre-requisite class). However, if they are unable to enroll, they will then email the department in order to be enrolled in whatever seats are being held. This is easily explained and able to be handled. However, this process will then repeat itself for every affected student, which then results in a constant stream of emails from students who cannot enroll in these classes, which then results in the same email being sent out to dozens of students. This entire process will then repeat itself again every semester.

As such, this change to the curriculum would allow the department to reduce the demand placed on these courses, making it easier for graduating seniors to get the courses they need to complete the degree. This may also allow some criminology 3LS students the opportunity to take a class that is typically reserved for 4LS, which would allow them to take a course necessary for them to successfully conduct research and complete a senior thesis in their senior year to earn honorary degree status. This change may also free up members of faculty

to teach other required and elective courses and expand our course offering and improve the quality of courses available to our majors. Finally, this change would help the department by reducing the workload on staff and advising from constantly needing to establish a complex system of holds every semester to prevent these courses from filling up.

Unfortunately, we were unable to determine exactly how many students outside the major have enrolled in these courses each semester for several reasons: (1) there is not a system in myufl or enterprise analytics available at this level that would allow us to easily tabulate and provide this statistic; and (2) given the complex set of steps that need to be taken each semester, such as putting in place the system of holds to prevent the classes from filling up too quickly, this has artificially reduced the number of outside majors able to enroll in these courses that otherwise would have but for our actions taken to prevent them. As a result, even if exact numbers of students from different majors were available for us to provide, these numbers would hide the actual problem occurring within the department each semester that needs to be addressed.

We are willing to override this prerequisite once our majors are able to register and allow students with a business concentration, etc. to take the courses if there are seats. We regularly do this in other courses that have this requirement that students be a major. Our primary concern is that we serve our majors first, because these are two required courses for our majors. As such, we respectfully request that this change be made to the curriculum.
