- B. UF Enrollment Management – Update from the Office of Admissions, Dr. Tammy Aagard, Associate Vice President for Enrollment Management – No Updates

- A. There are 131 International students coming in. Each student coming in will need the minimum of 12 credit hours and 9 have to have in person components. Previous existing students have been waived.
 - B. Summer B or Fall – new students to have in person component and so that they will be able to meet on campus for visa requirements
 - i. Current thought process identify students, majors, and then reach out to those Depts.
 - ii. Then have specific sections for face-to-face meetings or even just for a midterm exam or a quiz and then determine a compliant schedule.
 - iii. Placing a hold on their record
 - iv. Identify courses
 - v. Have those students advanced registered for those courses and create a List of those students
- IV. Fall Operations Discussion Dr. Lindner –
- A. The draft has been posted and the BOT will be approving or changing on Thursday and Friday
 - i. Identifying the on campus and face-to-face courses
 - 1. College of the Arts – Open Air Music 200 classes that need face to face interaction 75 are one on one lessons.
 - a. How much needs to meet in person can you put some of content online. How many rooms are needed, sound system to teach in 3 different rooms. Research, dancers cannot wear masks/voice lessons shade. Marching band field will be used a lot. Production – health consultant.
 - b. How are the colleges interpreting face-to-face courses, and is there consistency? Labs or teaching specific classes but it will be very small number of classes.
 - c. Physical separation to be socially engaged.
In general, physical distancing requirements knock classroom occupancy to ~25% so if you are thinking live grad classes take this into account. Even a small 10 person seminar will require a decent size classroom.

Housing will be at full capacity.
