¹ Exit Exam was constructed by Marian Borg and a committee of undergraduate instructors to reflect the content of the three required courses: SYG2000 (Principles of Sociology), SYA4300 (Methods of Social Research), and SYA4110 (Development of Sociological Thought, the required sociological theory course). The Exit Exam is administered on Sakai during students' final semester at UF and serves as the Assessment Tool for the core sociological material, based on the required course sequence.

² The Sociology program will examine the option of using a required paper with a departmental rubric as an additional assessment= tool, to be administered within the required methods course, SYA4300 Methods of Social Research. The idea will be explored between October 2012 and March 2013, resulting in a recommendation with regard to the rubric and plan for implementing this additional assessment.

Assessment Cycle

The assessment cycle is shown in tabular form (see below). Evaluation of SLOs will consist of review by a team of faculty. Faculty will be asked to provide materials for the evaluation process. Materials will be made available to the team in August 15 - October 31 of the assessment year (AY) and the team will formulate a list of improvement actions by January 31 of the following year and disseminate those materials by March 31.

The Sociology program plans to specifically assess SLO #5, Communication, in the 2012-2013 AY. A departmental committee will examine the option of using a required paper with a departmental rubric as an additional assessment tool, to be administered within the required methods course, SYA4300 Methods of Social Research. The idea will be explored between October 2012 and March 2013, resulting in a recommendation with regard to the rubric and plan for implementing this additional assessment in AY 2013-2014.
