Course Description

The study of rhythms, intervals, motifs, phrases, melodies, chords and chord progressions, in the standard clefs through listening, playing, and writing. Chord study includes primary and secondary triads in root position and inversions, non-harmonic tones and seventh chords.

Beyond acquiring skills and knowledge, students will experience different processes of learning and practicing to be better prepared for their future music theory courses and professional careers. Students will also be encouraged to relate content to their personal musical experiences and to work in a cooperative atmosphere.

Provide feedback regarding student's progress.


Evaluation information

- 3. Examine each leading-tone 7th chord and determine if the leading tone and the 7th resolve as expected.




2. Assignments/homework – At least once a week. May consist of exercises from the book, writing a melody, or any other activity relevant for the course.
