Course Description Legal Psychology is the study of the interaction between individuals and the legal system. How the application of various psychological disciplines can inform the legal system will be considered.

Prerequisites Psy2012

Co-requisites none

Rationale and Placement in Curriculum Legal Psychology is a discipline in psychology that examines the interface between psychological science and the legal system. It is a unique discipline within the field of psychology because of its wide application of various areas of psychology (i.e., Clinical, Social, Cognitive, Developmental, and Research Methodology and Statistics) to the legal system as well as its connections with numerous areas outside of psychology (e.g., criminology, political science, law, sociology, etc.). Legal Psychologists use the basic principles from the aforementioned areas to help improve the legal system at the individual and institutional levels.

Legal psychology offers students an advanced course of study that takes an interdisciplinary perspective to solving real world issues and exposes students to topics that are only superficially covered in other courses, if at all. That is, a course in Cognitive Psychology might have a small section in a chapter on long-term memory about the reliability of eyewitness testimony but no meaningful understanding about such a complex topic can be gleaned from such a short treatment. This course will offer students more than just a deeper understanding of an integral part of our society, it will provide them with an opportunity to gain practice in taking an interdisciplinary approach to solving problems by applying theory to novel areas. Also, it will benefit them to gain insight into how psychology may be used to improve the lives of both society and everyday people, which is arguably

the goal of all science.

Lastly, given the current social movements occurring in our society regarding the treatment of certain demographics by our legal system I cannot think of a more important and timely class than this. **Course Objectives** At the end of the course, students will have a better understanding of how the legal system can be informed by psychological research, and how psychological research can be reactive to legal issues. Specifically, students will have a better understanding of a variety of contemporary issues in the legal system, a basic understanding of research methods in the study of psychology and law, and understand how psychological research can inform legal policies and procedures.

Exams: Each exam consists of 45 multiple-choice questions and 1 open ended question. Each multiple-choice will be worth 2 points and the open ended question will be worth 10 points for a total of 100 points for each exam. There will be 4 exams in all and each exam will be non-cumulative, so 4 exams x 100 = 400 points total.

Quizzes: Quizzes for each module will be due at the end of each module/week. There will be 13 quizzes in total, one for each of the modules 1 -13, each worth 20 points (1 point per question), and your lowest quiz score will be dropped: 12 quizzes x (20 questions x .8 points each) = 192 points total.

Discussion Posts: Starting with module 1 we will have a discussion post about every other module

with the total number of posts being 8. Your posts will consist of an initial post which will entail you addressing the topic posed by me as well as a follow up response to one of your fellow students' posts. The purpose of these posts is for you to think critically about a topic and share your thoughts with your fellow students. To earn your full points, make sure you fully answer/address each component in the initial post and provide a thoughtful response to a fellow student's post. Each post will be worth a maximum of 10 points, so with 8 posts x 10 points = 80 points total.

Activities: Two activities are designed to be interactive and to reinforce material covered in that particular module. Each activity will be worth 24 points for a total of 48 points.
