IDH3931: Music and Health (3 credits)

HUM3940L: Arts in Healthcare Practicum 1 (2 credits)

HUMXXXX: Music in Medicine Capstone (1 credit) - proposed

Rationale and Place in Curriculum: The undergraduate Certificate in Music in Medicine complements existing School of Music programming, particularly for those seeking Music in Combination with an Outside Field in Pre-Health Professions. The certificate curriculum will provide students with an understand of the intersections between music and health disciplines and professional opportunities for engaging both disciplines. The certificate will be administered by the Center for Arts in Medicine in collaboration with the School of Music.
