Course Description: A hands-on, multidisciplinary approach to environmental horticulture delivered through the context of the human senses. Class activities, assignments, and projects are designed to enhance students' awareness and understanding of how horticulture relates to the natural and built world, as well as the ways in which people perceive those worlds.

Justification: This course provides an introduction to environmental horticulture with emphasis on the relationship between plants and the human sensory experience and the impact of plant sciences on the daily lives of humans. To be responsible and effective stewards of our environment, students should understand not only the environment and the plants used in landscapes, but also the ways in which humans use, experience, and are affected by plants. Students will gain a fundamental understanding of people-plant interactions that they may not obtain from courses where primary emphasis is on identification, use, or management of plants and landscapes.

Course Objectives: Upon completion of this course, students will be able to:

- Describe the basic biological functions of the human sensory organs.
- Assess uses of plants and explain how they relate to sensory perception.
- Demonstrate ways in which plants affect the sensory experience.
- Analyze the relationships between people and plants from biological and social perspectives.

ORH 2752 - Course Revisions

The course revisions for ORH 2754, Sensory Gardening are proposed for the purpose of attempting to increase course enrollment and offer a course that is more helpful in attracting additional students into the Plant Science Major. Surveys and feedback from students considering a change in major indicated that more students would enroll in the course if it was reduced from a 3 to 2 credits. Students enrolled in the ORH 1030, Plants, Gardening and You course indicated they would be more likely to take a 2 credit, rather than a 3 credit course to continue their enrollment in Plant Science related coursework. In order to achieve a reduction in course credit a series of in-class student projects / presentations were eliminated from the coursework and the following course objectives were eliminated from the course of plants and human senses on adaptation and global distribution of people and plants. Lectures relating to these topics have been eliminated from the material presented to students in the course. The course remains robust and impacting, even with these changes.
