Recently, the College of Agricultural and Life Sciences created 4911: Supervised Research and 4915: Honors Research for departments in the college so that all course numbers and course titles matched. We are requesting a similar approach to making changes to the current course number XXX 4905, which has been used for a number of purposes, including special topics, independent study, and individual study. The college would like all 4905 course numbers to be used for "Individual Study in <u>(major)</u>." However, because six majors had been using 4905 for independent study <u>and</u> for "special topics" courses, these six majors will need a special topics course. **Using the attached UCC1 form, we are requesting that XXX 4932: Special Topics in <u>(major)</u>" be created for AEC, ANS, ENY, EVS, FYC, and PLP. The UCC1 form is to create EVS 4932. We ask that this UCC1 be used as a template for the other courses being requested.**

The attached Excel spreadsheet "XXX4932 for CALS" provides details of the specific request to add XXX4932 to these majors. In addition to the Excel spreadsheet, we have included a syllabus template that would be used for all majors. The attached syllabus includes the required sections for a syllabus, but because this is a "special topics" course and would not lend itself to a standard syllabus for an ongoing course, we have only included the required sections and not completed full sections of the syllabus.
