Course Description An intensive introduction to Turkish, using the proficiency method. This course is equivalent to the University of Florida's first-year Turkish sequence.

Rationale and Placement in Curriculum The rich history and culture of the Turkish world are of increasing interest to the English-speaking world. Americans, while progressing through the 21st century, will look for understanding Turkey, a strategic country connecting Europe and the United States to Central Asia and the Middle East. Turkish language is the gateway into that understanding; its students gain the essential ability to relate to the Turkish world.

Course Objectives Throughout the course, students will:

- Acquire the basic language skills in listening, reading, speaking, and writing,
- Explore the historical, social, and cultural roots of Turkish, and,
- Communicate in Turkish in various platforms.

By the end of the semester, the students should expect to satisfy minimum courtesy requirements and maintain simple face-to-face conversations on familiar topics. They should also be able to ask for help and verify comprehension of native speech in face-to-face and written dialogues (the proficiency target level is ILR 1).
