Pedagogical Rationale/JustificationCurriculum Changes: JOURNALISM Overview

The degree plan changes are being made to better prepare students with skills for today's various media industries, primarily through the inclusion of a common capstone and a two-course specialized sequence. To do so, we are using existing courses, modifying the order of courses, tweaking existing courses and prereqs, and adding a new course. In addition, we are cleaning up some outdated preregs. Below lists the changes:

Impact on Enrollment, Retention, GraduationWe do not anticipate that this will change graduation. We do believe that with these changes (to make the major more relevant) we will increase enrollment and have high retention rates.

Specially, having a two-course sequence allows students to specialize in topics that are relevant to today's various journalism, media, and communications industries. And having a common capstone in which students work in small teams also mimics today's media work landscape, reinforcing our curriculum's relevancy and currency. **Assessment Data Review**Low scores in SLO data regarding journalism students' understanding of numeracy facilitated a need for inclusion of a required 1-credit class in numeracy for media and journalism professionals. For example, only 11% of students met or exceeded the standard of scoring 70 percent or higher on an assessment measuring basic knowledge of data numeracy.

Low scores in SLO data regarding journalism students' ability to use multiple element to produce a relevant story for publication facilitated a reconfiguration of curriculum progression and need for more intermediate and advanced work. For example, only 62% of students in Fall 2015 met or exceeded a standard measuring ability to publish relevant and timely stories.

Academic Learning Compact and Academic Assessment PlanWe will have to move our assessment sample from JOU 4201 course (now required, but no longer required) to MMC 3346 (an intermedia course to be required). As an intermedia step, this will let us better assess SLOs and make adjustments in curriculum as necessary.
