PURPOSE OF THIS COURSE: How do we make sure we stay well? What do we do when we get sick? What measures would you take to make sure someone you love gets the right care? These questions are an essential part of the human experience. By studying creative work that investigates questions related to illness and care, this course focuses on some of the broader issues surrounding healthcare and how these have been addressed through the arts. Students will be asked to produce their own creative reflections centered on health issues drawing from a variety of disciplines. On March 21st, the class will attend a performance of mercy killers together, as a part of the performing health festival sponsored by UF center for arts in medicine. This one-man show centers around joe (played by Michael Milligan, who also wrote the piece), an auto mechanic in middle America whose life is turned upside down when his wife is

diagnosed with a terminal illness and he cannot afford to pay for her care. Neither artistic experience nor specialized knowledge about healthcare is required for participation, only a readiness to engage creative and critical thinking.

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

By the end of this course, students will be able to

- describe and discuss creative work that investigates topics related to health and illness.
- explain related methods and media.
- apply social science health theory in the analysis of creative work.
- produce a creative work that is informed by the theories, methods, and topics covered in this course.
