Attendance and Active Participation (100 pts): In order to get the most out of this course

and to complete it successfully, it is essential that you keep up with the reading assignments and attend every class prepared for discussion. You will get out of this class what you put into it, and a commitment to being prepared for each session is the best way to set yourself up for doing well in this course. Attendance and active participation will be worth 10% of your grade.

Response Papers (300 pts total): Over the course of the semester, students are required to submit at least ten response papers, (1-2 pages double-spaced) based on the reading assignments. Students may submit as many additional papers as they wish, but only your top ten papers will count toward your grade. Each paper should include two paragraphs. The first paragraph should provide a summary of the central idea or argument of the reading. In the second paragraph you should evaluate that central idea or argument. Papers must be submitted prior to class discussion of the reading. No response papers will be accepted after class discussion of the reading has occurred. Further instructions will be given in class.

Exams (3, at 200 points each, for 600 pts total): Exams will be designed to test your grasp of the material presented, both in the readings and in the course lectures. A variety of question types will be used: matching, true/false, multiple choice, short answer, and essay questions are all fair game. Exams will not be cumulative.
