**Discussion/Finalize ORCID Promo Language**

Group discussed the three different versions written on the ORCID promo language (handout 1). It was suggested that we start with a bulleted document outlining why it is important to have this ID and why now. It was also suggested that we let the faculty know that this should only take about five minutes and that there is help at the libraries for not only training on how to create your ORCID ID but helping link past articles as well.

Once information is available, Judy Russell will let ULC know how many UF faculty already have ORCID ID's & how many are already linked in peoplesoft.

It was determined that this information would go out via the Faculty Newsletter and then be presented to Faculty Senate in the fall as an information item for a vote on a resolution.

## Create an ORCID identifier to support reporting processes and data sharing

### **Brief ORCID introduction**

ORCID (Open Researcher and Contributor ID) is a unique identifier associated with a specific author, contributor, or researcher. The ORCID remains with the researcher throughout his/her career and is independent of organization affiliation. ORCID is a not-for-profit organization, sustained by fees from member organizations. For more information about ORCID visit <http://orcid.org/content/about-orcid>.

### **Potential benefits of ORCID**

An ORCID is important for addressing author disambiguation (different authors with the same name) and linking scholarly publications across multiple systems such as scholarly publication synchronization with Thomson Reuters' ResearcherID, AIP Publishing, American Association for the Advancement of Science (AAAS), American Geophysical Union, and American Psychological Association (APA) to name a few. ### **ORCID becoming a requirement**

Increasingly, funding agencies and publishers are requiring an ORCID iD for each researcher associated with a given project or publication. On November 28, 2016, Wiley becomes the first major publisher to require ORCID IDs for submitting authors, <http://www.infodocket.com/2016/11/28/metadata-identifiers-wiley-becomes-first-major-publisher-to-require-orcid-ids-for-submitting-authors/>.

### **ORCID @ UF Premium Consortium membership**

Recently, George A. Smathers Libraries acquired an ORCID premium consortium membership as part of a consortia accession agreement through the Association of Southeastern Research Libraries/Greater Western Library Alliance ([ASERL/GWLA](#)). An ORCID institutional membership grants UF access to ORCID application programming interfaces (APIs) and web hooks in order to develop integration with UF and other publication systems for sharing faculty publication data/outputs. An ORCID will help to improve faculty annual reporting and contribute to a more efficient and streamlined reporting of research outputs for tenure and promotion packets. UF faculty, researchers, and students can add their ORCID to their myUFL profile. While it is the responsibility of the researcher to keep the ORCID profile accurate and current to effectively and properly disseminate scholarly output across distributed publication systems, an ORCID can be integrated into other publication systems to share research across platforms. ## **ORCID identifier to support research reporting and sharing**

Information systems, such as those maintained by publishers and funders, face author disambiguation challenge in connecting research to unique authors or contributors. ORCID (Open Researcher and Contributor ID) is a unique identifier associated with a specific author, contributor, or researcher. The ORCID remains with the researcher throughout his/her career and is independent of organization affiliation. ORCID is a not-for-profit organization, sustained by fees from member organizations. Many funders and publishers now require an ORCID number for each researcher associated with a given project or publication. The George A. Smathers Libraries acquired an ORCID institutional membership through the Association of Southeastern Research Libraries/Greater Western Library Alliance (ASERL/GWLA). The ORCID institutional membership grants UF access to the ORCID application programming interfaces (APIs) and web hooks in order to develop integration with UF systems for sharing faculty publication data/outputs.

## Using ORCID for Author Disambiguation

- Having an individual author identification number helps information systems connect your work with you, but current systems face challenges when your name is entered in a variety of different versions or other researchers have the same name as you.
- Additionally, if you've changed your name during your career, you need an author identification number that can keep all of your research connected to your new name.
- ORCID numbers make your list of sources more complete by aggregating search results from your other author IDs when they are linked to your ORCID account.
- ORCID can be integrated into many different publication systems to share research across platforms, which is unique to this identifier.
- More importantly, many funding agencies and publishers are now requiring an ORCID number for each researcher associated with a given project or publication.

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## **Resolution to Increase Funding for Libraries**

WHEREAS, the Libraries are crucially important to the educational and research mission of the University of Florida, and

WHEREAS, due to inflation, big journal packages serving all disciplines have increased from \$3.9M to \$5M between 2010 and 2016; and

WHEREAS, the overall budget for the UF Libraries has remained flat between 2010 and 2016;

THEFORE, LET IT BE RESOLVED that the University of Florida Faculty Senate, on behalf of the faculty of the University of Florida, *resolves that libraries are crucially important to the research mission of the university. All avenues -in addition to sponsored programs- should be explored to fund the libraries.*

## Open Access Publishing Fund Reinstatement - University of Florida

The George A. Smathers Libraries are very pleased to announce the reinstatement of the University of Florida Open Access Publishing (UFOAP) Fund. Thanks to the financial commitment of the Office of the Provost and the endorsement of the Faculty Senate Research and Scholarship Council, funding of \$120,000/year for four years has been committed to support open access publishing by UF faculty, staff and students.

The UFOAP Fund will begin accepting applications on January 1, 2017. Faculty, graduate students, staff and post-doctoral researchers who are the first named or corresponding author of open access scholarly articles accepted for publication after November 15, 2016 and who do not have access to funding through grants or other financial means of support will be eligible to apply for financial assistance in paying article processing charges assessed by open access journals.
