- Steering Committee Discussed self-insurance. There will be no change in the beginning. Plans are for self-insurance to start January 2013. The payment of 3% into the pension is currently in the courts. The regulation is still moving forward with an oral agreement from Dr. Machen that it will happen if the courts rule that we have to pay the 3%. Dr. Mair presented a request that 2012 homecoming be Nov 9, giving the university a four day weekend.

 - o Approve tree mitigation for the CTSI Building
 - Approved wall behind Smathers
 - o Approved removal of a magnolia by the architecture building
 - Approved moving understory trees along university and 13th due to planting the trees wrong.
- University Libraries Committee
 - Trying to drum up faculty support for open access publishing
 - Had open access week October 26
 - Discussed the Fine Arts & Music Libraries move nothing has been decided. DCP offered more space.
 - o Provost released some funding for faculty market adjustment
 - Some faculty searches ongoing
- Parking and Transportation Nothing to report, meeting is this afternoon.

Old Business

Neta researched Florida statutes and couldn't find any restrictions in the statues that limit the use of student technology fees to special technology projects. She asked again, can't we use the RCM or another mechanism to distribute those fees to the various units of the university annually, to enable an annual, line-item budget for each college and department, dedicated to its particular technology needs?
