The Intercollegiate Athletic Committee (IAC) is a faculty committee appointed by the President to provide oversight and recommend policies related to academic issues affecting or affected by intercollegiate athletics. The IAC Mission Statement is to:

- Recommend policy changes related to academic issues affecting or affected by intercollegiate athletics
- Monitoring of admissions and academic progress of all student-athletes
- Monitoring changes in NCAA and SEC rules and procedures relative to academic programs and progress
- Reviewing with the UAA compliance officer the institution's compliance program
- Receive, review and advise on various reports related to student athlete academic wellbeing (such as admissions, academic progress or others as identified by the committee or UAA)
- Report to the faculty on issues related to intercollegiate athletics via the University Senate at least once per year
- Make additional recommendations to the President on any other matters related to academic issues
 affecting or affected by intercollegiate athletics





IAC Data Collection Graduation Success Rate (GSR)

GSR

- Measures six year graduation rates at Division I institutions
- <u>Includes</u> transfers
- <u>Excludes</u> student-athletes who leave their institutions so long as they would have been academically eligible to compete had they remained
- The NCAA does not impose penalties for teams with low graduation rates






IAC Data Collection Academic Progress Rate (APR)

APR

- Each student-athlete receiving athletically related financial aid earns:
 - One <u>retention point</u> for staying in school
 - One <u>eligibility point</u> for being academically eligible
- A team's total points are divided by points possible and then multiplied by one thousand
- Teams with low APR values face sanctions from the NCAA
 - Minimum multiyear APR is 930
 - New NCAA Revenue Share Model for Academics- 985 or higher



Each school can earn one academic achievement unit per year if its student-athletes meet at least one of the following requirements:

- Earn an overall, single-year, all-sport Academic Progress Rate of 985 or higher.
- Earn an overall all-sport Graduation Success Rate of 90 percent or higher.
- Earn a federal graduation rate that is at least 13 percentage points higher than the federal graduation rate of the student body at that school

GROWTH IN THE NEW ACADEMIC DISTRIBUTION PER SCHOOL

The size of the academic distribution could grow as projected below. The graph is based on approximately 228 schools per year qualifying for the academic distribution. The size of the unit would vary depending on how many schools qualify in a given year, projected to be about 66.3 percent of all Division I schools per year.

Example on how to earn a 985 or higher


- A Division I Football Bowl Subdivision team awards 85 scholarships
 170 POINTS POSSIBLE
- If 82 student-athletes remain in school <u>and</u> academically eligible
 O EARN 164 POINTS
- 3 remain in school but are academically ineligible
 O EARN 3 POINTS
- 1 drops out academically ineligible
 - EARN 0 POINTS
- The team earns 167 of 170 possible points for that term.
- Divide 167 by 170 and multiply by 1,000 to determine that the team's Academic Progress Rate for that term is 982.




Single Year Academic Progress Rate (APR)





Multiyear Academic Progress Rate (APR)








Perceptions of college sports
