

James Seale, Jr., professor, Food and Resource Economics Department, came to the University of Florida (UF) in 1985. He has a B.A. degree in English from the University of Mississippi. He attended graduate schools at the University of Chicago and the University of Michigan studying economics and at the University of Georgia and Michigan State University studying agricultural economics. He received his Ph.D. in agricultural economics from Michigan State University. His current interests include urban food consumption in China, policy implications of the Food Safety Modernization Act (FSMA) on U.S. food producers and food exporters to the U.S. market, land allocation among major crops in the U.S., China, and Russia, and cross-country demand for food and energy. Currently, he is a member of the Faculty Senate, Chair of the UF Budget Council, a member of the UF Faculty Senate Steering Committee, 2015-2017, and a member of the Academic Freedom, Tenure, Professional Relations and Standards Committee. He also served this academic year as Faculty Senate liaison to the University Budget Task Force. Previously, he served as a Faculty Senator, 2011-2014, as Chair and member of the University Constitution and Regulations Committee, and as Chair and member of the Food and Resource Economics' Bylaws Committee. These experiences have provided first-hand insight into how shared governance works at the UF and how it could be strengthened. If elected as Faculty Senate Chair, one project of his would be to promote unification of rules and regulations governing faculty such as retirement programs.
