My first association with UF was in 1991 as a undergradaute student, and since that time I have recevied three degrees from this institution (BS 1993, MS 1995, Ph.D. 1998). In order to address this descrepancy, the UF Faculty Sentate should make increasing the defined contribution to equal at least the national average a multi-year goal. My efforts in the faculty senate would be to make UF more competitive for hiring and retaining faculty strive to ensure UF's employer contribution plans are equal to our peer institutions.
