## 2. Student Organization Policies

Solange Douglas, Associate Director, Department of Student Activities and Involvement Loren Israel, Risk Management Services, Student Affairs

- a. Student Affairs is working on defining UF's relationships to student organizations.
- b. Nearly 1000 student organizations registered on campus, including over 2 dozen types
- c. Requirements for a student group
  - i. 3 officer minimum
  - ii. 10 or more members
  - iii. Approved faculty/staff advisor
  - iv. Approved constitution
  - v. Compliance with university Policies
  - vi. Comes with benefits and privileges

- d. Relations with Registered Student Organizations (RSOs) and UF hasn't been clearly defined
  - i. Doing benchmarking with other institutions to see how they defined student groups
  - ii. By clearly defining student groups, other institutions were able to decrease confusion and provide student services.

#### e. Definitions

- i. General- separate third party entities without a legal affiliation to UF or any UF entities.
- ii. University Sponsored- extensions of a university unit, which may consist of student volunteers, that operate in direct service to the University's mission.
- iii. Now all student groups will be classified into one definition or another so they'll receive appropriate benefits

## f. Access/Privileges

- i. General
  - 1. Separate third party entities
  - 2. Cannot use UF, University of Florida or Gators in name or social media
  - 3. Not covered by UF insurance and not tax-exempt
  - 4. Not allowed to use UF or UAA logos
  - 5. Eligible for SG Allocations (if criteria met)
  - 6. Can still meet on campus
- ii. University Sponsored
  - 1. Serve University Mission
  - 2. Considered part of UF, and their unit provides them resources
  - 3. Covered by UF's insurance for UF events and functions
  - 4. May use UF tax-exempt status as approved by the authorized unit head
  - 5. May be approved to use UF unit brands in social media and marketing
  - 6. Not allowed to use UF or UAA logos
  - 7. Not eligible for SG Allocations
- g. Classification Criteria (for an RSO to be University Sponsored)
  - i. Name has a direct affiliation to university unit/program
  - ii. Mission, purpose, functions, membership are adopted by unit
  - iii. Unit provides one or more exclusive benefits
  - iv. Regularly represents unit at functions, events
  - v. Unit grants permission to use its marketing and advertising
  - vi. Unit directs criteria/selection of officers or members
  - vii. Unit employee required/has duty to direct, oversee, supervise
  - viii. Training/development by unity
  - ix. Dissolution of unit would lead to dissolution of RSO
  - x. Considered essential to function of unit

#### h. What does this mean?

- i. Each student organization will be classified as either General or University Sponsored
- ii. SAI will start classifying student organizations in the next registration cycle (July 1 to Sept 2)
  - 1. Believe that most will classify as General
  - 2. USSO (University Sponsored) will need to have approval from home department to be registered
- iii. Must ensure that events/organizations are meeting new guidelines
  - 1. Units must fully own university sponsored organization events, and cannot play a role in non-sponsored (General) events
  - 2. Must follow the "spirit" of the classification
  - 3. Fulfill requirements necessary from SAI to correctly categorize student groups

# i. Case Study

- i. Performance Based show
  - 1. Hosted by a large, student-led organization, classified as general

- 2. Annual event, student organized, typically supported by A&S fees and donated/raised funds
- 3. Organizers sought support form university areas to assist in covering cosets, and the department assists.
- 4. Community member attends the event and asks for an accommodation less than 72 hours in advance, which group doesn't accommodate.
  - a. If community member decided to sue UF, it may be able to, only because UF's resources were used in making it a public event.
  - b. If the organization maintained its private, third party status, it wouldn't have been required to meet that accommodation.

# j. Suggested next steps

- i. Evaluate current policies related to student organizations
- ii. Review and apply the classification criteria to student organizations in your area
  - 1. Which groups may be functioning as university-sponsored in your area, but should be general based on your current relationship
  - 2. Do one or more criteria description apply to a student group in your area that you think should be classified as General
- iii. Discuss the current relationships that student organizations have to your unit
  - 1. Are you free of risk or liability for groups that don't have a relationship to UF?
  - 2. Do you need to alter your current policies?
  - 3. What steps are necessary to align to advice given?
- iv. Connect with Student Activities and Involvement to discuss challenges, concerns, and impact.

- I. Questions from Floor:
  - i. For university sponsored groups, how do organization elections work?
    - 1. For general groups, fully elected by the student members
    - 2. For university sponsored groups, students can elect their own members under the guidance of the unit, with the unit having final say.
  - ii. For university sponsored student groups, the student members are also volunteers (essentially unpaid employees), so they are supervised by the unit, not just advised by the student organization advisor.
  - iii. For ambassador groups who are not registered student organizations, do they need to register a student organization?
    - 1. They do not have to register, but their advice is to register with SAI.
    - 2. SAI is updating the constitution guidelines, since those guidelines will differ for general and university-sponsored organizations
    - 3. If they are really doing the work on behalf of the university, they need to be registered as volunteers through HR, so they can receive insurance coverage and protect all parties.
      - a. There's a new volunteer policy through HR's website, and they must be registered through E-Path.

# iv. Funding

- 1. University sponsored organization must get their own funding from their own unit/department(s)
- 2. General groups are still eligible to receive funding from SG allocations
- v. Peer Advisors who are paid OPS employees

- 1. If they are considered more a program of the office, that would be considered employment (since they are being paid).
- vi. Student organizations must have a constitution before registering, but for university sponsored organizations, the constitution will essentially be the guidelines that university sponsored organizations must follow (so the language would be standard).
- vii. University sponsored organizations would still need to meet the student organization requirements (10 members, 3 officers, etc.)
  - 1. If you have a group that doesn't meet those requirements, consider them volunteers and register them as volunteers with HR.
