Professional Curriculum Committee Program and Course Recommendations

1. PharmD/MS Combination Degree

- Summary:
 - The College of Pharmacy seeks to create a combination degree program between the Master of Science in Pharmacy (M.S.P.) and the Doctor of Pharmacy (Pharm.D.)
- Comments:
- There are 4 MS credits are shared with the PharmD but 10 are double counted. How does this work? Response: up to 6 credit hours of course work that is part of the PharmD may be shared with the MS program and up to an additional 6 credit hours of the respective MS program are shared with the PharmD program as elective credits adding up to a total of up to 12 shared credit hours.
- Under the double-counted credits, can there be an opening sentence stating that students in
 the combination program may double-count up to 10 credit hours total. Then, describe the
 shared credits: PharmD = 6 elective hours from MS courses & MS = 4 credit hours from
 PharmD courses Response: Yes, we can add a sentence although the credit hours vary by MS
 degree since some of the PharmD courses are applicable to the respective MS and vice versa.
 In any event, a maximum of up to 12 credit hours can be double counted for both degrees.
- Under the double counted credits, is it possible to remove/rephrase the last two sentences in the 1st paragraph—"No PharmD courses are removed from the double counted credits, only PharmD courses are double counted towards MS degree." Based on the bullet above, All approved PharmD credits counting towards the MS are counted as "core required" courses. Approved MS courses towards the PharmD are counted as elective credits. Response: this does apply to some but not all MS concentrations. I agree that the sentence as currently phrased is confusing and we will remove it and instead use the above suggestion to clarify the amount of credit hours that can be double counted.
- Under Coherent Course of Study, should there be an opening sentence stating that students
 begin the PharmD program. Then after acceptance to the MS combination degree, students
 may take both MS and PharmD course simultaneously? Response: we will add this sentence.
 However, we will limit how many MS courses a PharmD student can take in spring and fall
 semesters while they can take more MS courses in the summer when they are not enrolled in
 didactic PharmD courses.
- Under Coherent Course of Study, the 1st sentence states, "7-10 credits taken within the PharmD program." If students can take 7-10 PharmD credits, should the double counted

eredits be up to a total of 16 shared credits, or are they required, but just not all are double-counted? "MS = 7-10 hours from PharmD courses, instead of 4"? Response: this needs to be changed since there are only 6 credit hours maximum that are PharmD courses that can be counted towards the MS degree and an additional 6 credit hours from a MS degree that can be shared with the PharmD curriculum for a total of 12 credit hours.

- Under Student Qualifications, is successful progression of PharmD (or PharmD grades) considered in? Response: yes, we will add this to the qualifications. We will monitor the academic performance of PharmD students upon admission to the MS degree as well as frequently while enrolled in both the PharmD and MS programs.
- MS degree with Pharmacoeconomics concentration is 33 credits but other MS with other
 concentrations is 32. Any concerns? Response: not, this is not of concern as we do not require
 students to complete both degrees at the same time. In other words, a student may complete
 their PharmD studies and can complete the MS degree subsequently. Completion of either
 degree does not impact completion of the other.
- Does COP have an idea of how many students may decide on the combo degree? How many per concentration? Response: we do not know but expect a relatively low initial enrollment, maybe 1 or 2 per concentration in the summer 2025.
- Please verify the concentrations for the MS degree. There are 6 listed in the rationale for the
 combination degree, and 7 under the coherent course of study. Response: there are 7 MS
 concentrations offered. This will be corrected.
